




# MAYOTTE

#### CNN —

Thousands are feared dead after a devastating 100-year cyclone ripped across the French archipelago of Mayotte on Saturday, inflicting destruction that one resident likened to an atomic bomb. "The situation is catastrophic, apocalyptic," Bruno Garcia, owner of Hotel Caribou in Mamoudzou, Mayotte's capital, told CNN-affiliate BFMTV. "We lost everything. The entire hotel is completely destroyed," Garcia said. "There is nothing left. It's as if an atomic bomb fell on Mayotte."

Mayotte lies in the Indian Ocean off the east coast of Africa, just west of Madagascar. Made up of two main islands, its land area is about twice the size of Washington DC. Cyclone Chido, a category 4 storm, tore through the southwestern Indian Ocean over the weekend, impacting northern Madagascar before rapidly intensifying and slamming Mayotte with winds above 220 kilometers per hour (136 miles per hour), according to France's weather service. It was the strongest storm to hit the islands in more than 90 years, Meteo-France said.

The cyclone flattened neighborhoods, knocked out electrical grids, crushed hospitals and schools and damaged the airport's control tower. "Honestly, what we are experiencing is a tragedy, you feel like you are in the aftermath of a nuclear war... I saw an entire neighborhood disappear," Mohamed Ishmael, a Mamoudzou resident, told Reuters.

French President Emmanuel Macron said late Monday on X that he planned to travel to Mayotte "in the coming days to support our fellow citizens, civil servants and the emergency services that have been mobilized." He added that he would declare a national mourning period. France's minister for everyday security, Nicolas Daragon, said on social media late Sunday the first military planes providing emergency aid to the cyclone-battered island had landed. France is "standing by their side with a helping hand," acting interior minister Bruno Retailleau. Retailleau said that France had mobilized two naval ships and that they were hopeful that more flights would be able to enter the territory soon, noting that flights cannot land at night yet given how badly the airport was affected by the cyclone.

Located about 5,000 miles from Paris, Mayotte is the poorest place in the European Union and has struggled with unemployment, violence and a deepening migration crisis. In recent decades, tens of thousands of people from neighboring Comoros and Madagascar have come to Mayotte seeking better economic conditions and access to the French welfare system.

Chad Youyou, a resident in Hamjago in the north of Mayotte, posted videos to Facebook showing flattened trees and extensive damage to his village, the Associated Press reported. "Mayotte is destroyed … we are destroyed," he said.

#### **General Information**

• Relax, have fun, and do your best. The judges want you to succeed!

#### **Performance Information**

- In the interest of fairness, please help us maintain anonymity in competition as much as possible:
  - Entries will be announced by the judges, by number and title.
  - Competitors should not wear any identifying clothing.
- Group Skits and Choral selections must be memorized.
  - $\circ$  No written scripts may be used on stage during these competitions.
  - Prompting from the audience is not permitted.
- You may only record/video/photograph your own school's students.

#### **Performance Time Limits**

- Timing will be from the first spoken word to the bow. To indicate that a skit is over, one or more students in the skit should bow at the end of the skit.
- Time limits are as follows:

Group Skit, Level I/II	4-6 minutes
Group Skit, Level III/Advanced	5-8 minutes
Choral, Solo/Duet	5 minutes
Choral, Group	5 minutes

If the minimum time limit is not met, or if the maximum time limit is exceeded, one point per 10 seconds will be subtracted from the time management category on the score sheet. The maximum penalty will be 10 points per entry. Note the following scale:

This lovely song by Kali, a well-known singer from Martinique, sung in French and in Martinican Creole, advises us to "go up the river," which represents the path of life and of love. You must keep going up the river in spite of the "rocks and roots" (life's obstacles). You must observe what's around you: ("Wouvè dé zyé'w gran" – open your eyes wide), and be aware of the path ("Toujou gadé koulè dlo-a" – always watch the water flow), in order to finally reach the source of the river (the end of life's journey).

#### 5. Tahiti (BM)

These young French performers dream of Tahiti, where they can go and live their best life.

#### 6. Ma Meilleure Ennemie

Stromae and Pomme's beautiful song from Season 2 of Arcane.

#### 7. La Chanson thème de Gilligan's Island

Just sit right back and have a listen to The Ballad of Gilligan's Island...*en français*! After all, the old TV show did air in Canada, France, and Luxembourg!

### <u>FILMS</u> 10h00 -et- 13h00 (Room 3104)

#### 10h00 – Rue Cases Nègres

(In French with subtitles in English)

*Rue Cases-Nègres* (Sugar Cane Alley) is a 1983 French-language film directed by Euzhan Palcy, based on the 1950 semi-autobiographical novel Rue Cases-Nègres by Joseph Zobel. The film is set in the 1930s in Martinique, a French Caribbean colony, and follows the life of a young Black boy named José, who is raised by his grandmother in a poor sugarcane workers' community. The story explores themes of colonialism, racism, and social mobility as José, a bright and ambitious student, strives for an education to escape the hardships of plantation life. His grandmother, M'Man Tine, sacrifices a lot to give him the opportunity to succeed, emphasizing the power of knowledge as a means of liberation. The film is widely acclaimed for its poignant storytelling and historical authenticity, making it an important work in Caribbean cinema.

#### 13h00 – Vampire humaniste cherche suicidaire consentant

(In French with subtitles in English)

Vampire humaniste cherche suicidaire consentant (Humanist Vampire Seeking Consenting Suicidal Person) is a 2023 French-Canadian dark comedy film directed by Ariane Louis-Seize. The film follows Sasha, a young vampire who struggles with her moral dilemma: unlike her bloodthirsty family, she is too empathetic to kill. Instead of preying on victims, she seeks a consenting person who wishes to die. This leads her to meet Paul, a depressed and lonely man willing to let her feed on him. The film blends dark humor, horror, and drama while exploring themes of morality, loneliness, and the search for connection. It offers a fresh, introspective take on the vampire genre, balancing its eerie premise with a deeply human story.






